
National Audubon launches Native Plant Tool!







The French and Pickering Creeks in Chester and Berks Counties are among the most pristine tributaries in the Schuylkill River Watershed. You can join the effort to keep them beautiful as a Schuylkill Water Steward!

As a Schuylkill Water Steward volunteer, you will participate in five fun and engaging training sessions through which you will learn about the science of healthy watersheds, threats to our local streams, water sampling techniques, and more. Training begins October 15, 2016 and continues through November 12, 2016. Following your training, you'll get to work protecting area streams by:

- Monitoring water quality
- · Observing aquatic wildlife and their habitats
- Keeping an eye on stormwater
- Planting and managing streamside buffers
